Training for Educators and Professionals Nationwide

Gender Spectrum trainings provide professionals, including teachers and other educators, physicians, mental health providers and other child-serving professionals, with foundational knowledge on gender and gender diversity. We also provide the tools and resources they need to make a real impact in the lives of all of the youth they serve. Our professional trainings underscore that restrictive notions of gender limit all children's growth and development. In addition to our work with school districts and state departments of education across the country, we also train leading national organizations to be more gender inclusive in all of their messaging—helping create broad changes that impact millions of children nationwide.

We also continue to host a one-day Professionals' Symposium. This year we significantly expanded the Symposium, with more workshop facilitators and presenters who focused on intersectionality, particularly with respect to gender, race, and faith.

Gender Spectrum was recently awarded a highly competitive, five year \$1.2 million grant from the California Department of Public Health. The grant will support our school trainings and provide resources to help monitor and measure the impact of our work on school climates generally and on transgender and other gender-expansive youth in particular. At completion, we will have evaluation data to strengthen our focus, create a base of knowledge on which further projects can build, and validate our work with foundations, government agencies and other funders.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CASE STUDIES

Shirley: Elementary School Teacher

Our work with major national school leadership organizations, including school principals and counselors, has the potential to make significant changes in the way that gender is talked about-and taught- in schools nationwide.

Shirley, an elementary school teacher from Northern California who attended our Professionals' Symposium, is one teacher who exemplifies the value of our work. Shirley learned of Gender Spectrum shortly before the Symposium, and she was eager to work on creating a gender-inclusive classroom and school environment, noting "I want to work at the school level, looking at systems and how we can train teachers and talk to parents about this work." She also expressed how influential teachers are in creating safe spaces at school where students can be free "from stereotypes and rules that limit them."

After the Symposium, Shirley felt empowered to take our work back to her school. "This work is not something I have to do alone," she said. "Gender Spectrum meets people where they are, and they have a conversation....That feels really good to me, because I've been bumping up against some resistance."

THE INCLUSIVE SCHOOLS NETWORK

Our Inclusive Schools Network is a first-of-its-kind nationwide learning community of educational professionals committed to creating school settings where every child is seen, understood and honored. By the end of 2017, we will have six Institutes held in California, Massachusetts and North Carolina. For 2018, we plan to add Institutes in Texas, Missouri and Nevada, and through the National Association of Independent Schools.





Providing Safe Spaces for Youth and Families Nationwide

A September 2017 World Health Organization/Johns Hopkins study of children ages 10-14 from fifteen countries confirmed the need for our work for all children. The study found that, from a young age, children were already entrenched in stereotypical gender assumptions. As the study's author noted, children "quickly internalise the myth that girls are vulnerable and boys are strong and independent." Gender Spectrum's Family Education program engages with parents, primary caregivers, and family members, to help them better understand gender and support young people in their lives. Working with youth and families, we help create safe spaces where all children can grow to be who they are.

While gender constructs impact the lives of all children and youth, we know that those who fall outside society's restrictive ideas about gender experience the greatest harm. Gender Spectrum provides support nationwide to young people and families who need resources and safe spaces to connect. While many assume that gender-expansive young people can find local support, through LGBTQ centers or other services, too often this is simply not the case. Many areas have no services, and even in areas with local centers, gender-expansive young people often do not seek nor know where to find supportive adults. Many of these kids are concerned about maintaining their privacy around gender, leading to greater isolation and risk.

We know the dire consequences from social isolation and family rejection—and the power of support from parents or other adults. Recent data show that 41% of transgender or gender-expansive youth surveyed have attempted suicide (9 times higher than average). Of those who attempted suicide, 57% indicated their family chose not to speak or spend time with them. But parental support makes an enormous difference: **teens who perceive that their parents strongly support their gender are 93% less likely to attempt suicide than teens who feel unsupported.** Another study found that any positive adult interaction can have a tremendous impact: transgender and gender-expansive teens who have an adult to go to were 2.3 times less likely to attempt suicide. Unfortunately, these youth were also 1.5 times less likely to know an adult they felt they could go to for help.

For many youth, our online community and programs provide a lifeline of support, accurate information and up-to-date resources. Our approach in youth programming is based on research indicating that a supportive community and family, connection with other gender-expansive youth, and access to quality and empowering resources are all essential for healthier outcomes for gender-expansive young people.

YOUTH SERVICES CASE STUDY

Gender Spectrum’s Online Pre-Teen Group

We all know that puberty can be a very vulnerable time, and for gender-expansive young people the pre-teen years are especially challenging. Our online Pre-Teen Group is the only online national group for transgender, non-binary and gender-expansive kids ages 10-12, and is often the only space where these kids can be open and feel safe. Gender Spectrum staff provide the expertise and guidance to ensure the group serves each child’s needs. Discussions in the group often start casually, with talk about families, pets, favorite books and movies and the like. But quickly, many truly vital conversations take place.

One recent participant exemplifies this pattern. Tyler* joined the group this fall, but for three weeks he never spoke or let anybody see him via his web camera. In the fourth session, Tyler found the comfort and confidence needed and became an active participant, joining the chat by video and talking throughout the conversation. His Mom later told us that she was amazed to see this progress, and that Tyler told her how excited he was to meet other transgender kids.

The power of peer relationships is clear in the pre-teen group. These kids often have no one to talk with about going on overnight school trips, using bathrooms, or simply navigating the many unpredictable situations that come up in their lives. In one recent group, one participant expressed concerns about how to tell extended family members about their use of they/them pronouns, and was excited to hear from another group member who had just navigated the same problem.

When the group needs guidance, our staff and volunteers are ready to suggest ways that the youth can explore their gender, and navigate the often inaccurate information they find online. Our High School Youth Council members also often join the pre-teen discussions and provide valuable insights as older peers who have been through many of the same challenges.

The Gender Spectrum Conference

Our annual conference continues to be the nation's preeminent gathering for transgender, non-binary and other gender-expansive youth and their families. The 2017 Conference was significantly more diverse, with a wider variety of workshops and presentations.

FAMILY EDUCATION CASE STUDY

Helping a Mom in Need

In addition to our support groups and other education and support services for parents and families, every year Gender Spectrum staff respond to hundreds of calls and emails from parents and family members who are seeking help. Often these families have nowhere else to turn, and cannot find the resources they desperately need. In one case, we heard from Ellen,* a mom with a problem. Ellen was having a hard time understanding her child, Tracy's, transgender gender identity, and she was not supporting Tracy's gender alignment process. But, when Tracy developed severe depression and attempted suicide, Ellen knew that something had to change, or she would lose her child. Ellen contacted us, and our staff lent her support and advice. We provided mental health referrals, shared tools for engaging with schools, connected her with legal support, and provided other needed assistance to help Ellen find the courage she needed to fully support her child—regardless of gender. Ellen is now a regular participant in our online National Parents Support Group and has become Tracy's greatest advocate, as well as a vital resource to other parents who are just starting in their journeys.

Expanding Our Reach Through Partnerships Nationwide, and Beyond

We are reaching more families than ever, but we know that many families have not found us, and we are aiming to serve families with a more diverse range of backgrounds. Our focus in the coming year has turned to better meeting the needs of African American families, Latinx families, and families with strong faith ties. One way we plan to reach new families is through strengthening and initiating new partnerships with leading national and regional organizations. Among other current collaborations, we have recently partnered with the national nonprofit Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS), which includes more than 300 affiliates across the country, serving millions of children. Gender Spectrum Executive Director Lisa Kenney has been invited to serve on a BBBS Advisory Board and we look forward to supporting their tremendous work regarding gender and youth across the country. We are also pleased to expand our partnership with PFLAG. In 2018 we will continue to support PFLAG National, as well as regional chapters, through parent trainings, facilitator trainings and support, and presenting at their national convention.

CASE STUDIES:

Partnering for National and International Impact

Our work across the country, and even internationally, shows the importance of developing strong partnerships with other regional and national groups working on educational, anti-discrimination, LGBTQ and other related issues. There are many groups doing amazing work, and our goal is to support their progress and provide our expertise to make their work even stronger.

Our partnership with Mexico City’s Council for the Prevention and Elimination of Discrimination (COPRED), an autonomous agency charged with preventing and eliminating discrimination in the city, is a compelling example of how we help elevate other groups’ work. Gender Spectrum has been collaborating with COPRED for more than six years, starting from an introduction by a current Gender Spectrum Board member. Early on, our presentation in Mexico City at a COPRED meeting with a wide range of city government leaders, health professionals and others helped assure the passage of a city ordinance to protect the rights of minors seeking gender related name changes on legal documents. COPRED members have attended our annual Conference, and we have streamed programming in Spanish for COPRED members online. Our Conference inspired COPRED to develop their own two-day Gender Conference in Mexico City, with one day for professionals and one day for families. Our staff attended their conference and presented plenary sessions on both days. Our partnership with COPRED provides a context to help build content that is culturally relevant among diverse cultures, with many benefits, including an increase in both written and sub-titled video content in Spanish. Overall, our work is strengthening this leading city institution’s ability to understand and support gender-expansive children and families.

In our work towards creating more gender inclusive health education, our partnerships will also dramatically increase the impact of our work. We are currently developing a major report on gender inclusive health and puberty education (“sex ed”) that will be co-released with Planned Parenthood and several other groups. Also in 2017, we joined a coalition of national organizations, including Advocates for Youth, the National Association of City and County Health Officials and several others working with the Centers for Disease Control on approaches to gender and gender diversity in school-based health programs. While this is a new partnership, it has already led to joint workshop presentations at major national conferences, Planned Parenthood and other groups presenting at the Gender Spectrum Conference, and plans for joint webinars. Working together, we will create heightened awareness of the benefits of gender-inclusive health education, and also bring our central messages of gender-inclusion to larger audiences.

Collaborations with Corporations, Government and Other Institutions

Major corporations, government agencies and other institutions are recognizing that society's evolving understandings around gender have significant implications for their work. Gender Spectrum offers individualized trainings tailored to each company, agency, or institution's needs, working on developing gender-inclusive workplaces and policies, recruiting and retaining employees, identifying best-practices for gender-related marketing, and other issues to make their work more effective. We know there is much more that needs to be done—we need staff and resources to work on educating doctors, mental health practitioners, and other health care workers; to put more focus on early childhood education; to advance policies and support legal challenges to discriminatory laws.

And in these challenging political times, our already strained resources are stretched even further by the urgent demands that arise when we are called to respond to the current administration's policies, to join legal challenges to discriminatory laws, or heed countless requests for urgent assistance. Your investment in Gender Spectrum in these trying times is especially critical for our ongoing work and for building the capacity we need to meet the ever-growing need.

Every child needs healthy, loving and supportive environments to reach their full potential.
